

A2.32 Polychaete/oligochaete-dominated upper estuarine Pontic littoral mud

Summary

The habitat is present in the Black Sea estuaries where mud is present. It is not present in the Sea of Marmara. Eutrophication is the main historic pressure on this habitat. Additional pressures include: coastal development and chemical pollution. Conservation and management measures relevant to this habitat include: measures to maintain physical and biological integrity, improvement of water quality controls, coastal development controls, survey and monitoring programmes, increased public awareness and designation of MPAs.

Synthesis

Detailed information on the abundance and extent of this habitat is lacking. Information on the quantity and quality of this habitat including historical or recent trends is unknown. For the purposes of Red List assessment this habitat is considered to be Data Deficient.

A2.32 Polychaete/oligochaete-dominated upper estuarine Pontic littoral mud

No characteristic photographs currently available for this habitat.

Habitat description

Upper estuarine sandy mud and mud shores, in areas with significant freshwater influence. Littoral mud typically forms mudflats, though dry compacted mud can form steep and even vertical structures, particularly at the top of the shore adjacent to saltmarshes. Little oxygen penetrates these cohesive sediments, and an anoxic layer is often present within millimetres of the sediment surface.

There are three oligochaete dominated upper estuarine mud biotopes variously dominated by polychaetes, oligochaetes and chironomids. The Pontic 'Camca' biotope which is associated with this habitat is unique to Danube River mouths.

Indicators of quality:

Both biotic and abiotic indicators have been used to describe marine habitat quality. These include: the presence of characteristic species and those which are sensitive to the pressures the habitat may face; water quality parameters; levels of exposure to particular pressure and more integrated indices which describe habitat structure and function, such as trophic index, or successional stages of development in habitats that have a natural cycle of change over time.

There are no commonly agreed indicators of quality for this habitat, although particular parameters may

have been set in certain situations e.g. protected features within Natura 2000 sites, where reference values have been determined and applied on a location-specific basis.

Characteristic species:

The upper estuarine mud communities support few infaunal species and are principally characterised by a restricted range of polychaetes and oligochaetes. Chironomids are present in the upper estuary where fresh water conditions are prevalent.

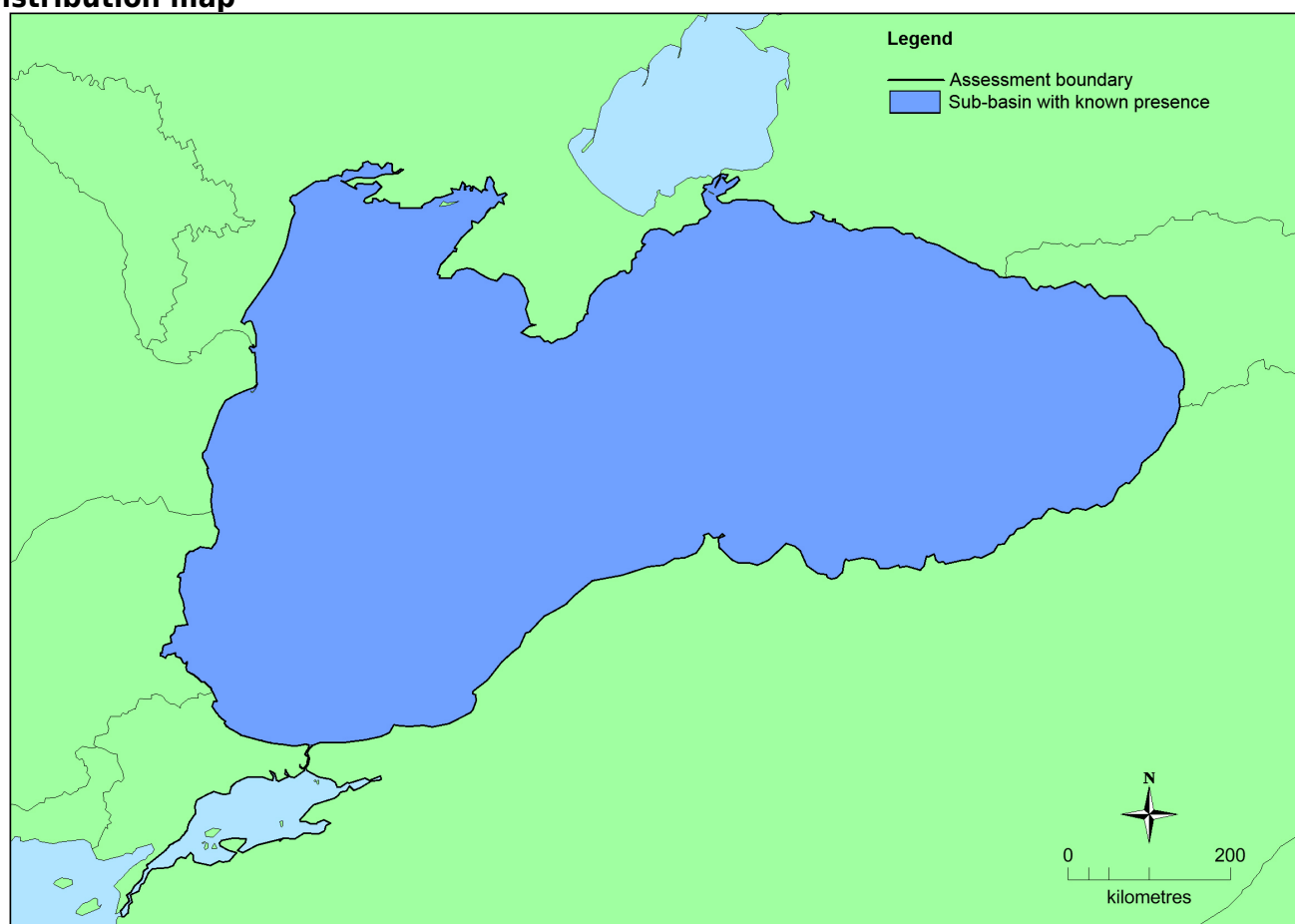

Pressures and threats

Eutrophication as a result of nutrient enrichment (N, P and organic matter) is the most significant historic pressure on the habitat. Hypoxic and anoxic events resulted in mass mortality of faunal species. Since the 1990s this pressure has reduced due to tighter controls on pollution in the catchment of the Danube and other rivers which enter the north-west Black Sea. Whilst this pressure is now reduced it is still a continuing threat in the current and future periods. This is especially true for non EU countries surrounding the Black Sea which are not bound by the agreements such as the Water Framework Directive (WFD).

Coastal developments including the construction of marinas and slipways, sediment extraction, the widening and dredging of channels, creation of artificial beaches, road construction and sea defences. These activities may alter the hydrological regime which will in turn affect the character and viability of the habitat.

Chemical pollution. This is a threat of current and future importance which at its most severe can result in species can lead to mortality. High mortality rates can lead to a reduction in extent. Lower mortality rates will result in a reduction in habitat quality. Chemical pollution may also affect the size and growth rate of some of the associated fauna.
