



A ponto-caspian moth species. In the Western Europe it occurs in the Carpathian basin and in the Balkan Peninsula. Within the EU it is known as well from Romania and Bulgaria. It is a steppe species. In Europe it occurs in exclaves of open steppe vegetation on sands or loess and in xerophilous grasslands on alkaline substrates.

The conservation status in the Pannonian biogeographical region is 'unfavourable inadequate'. Although the range area and the population size are stable they are not sufficient to ensure long-term viability. The unique populations are relatively small and isolated, tied to the islands of steppe vegetation usually surrounded with an arable land. The conservation status in the Mediterranean biogeographical region is 'unknown', information
