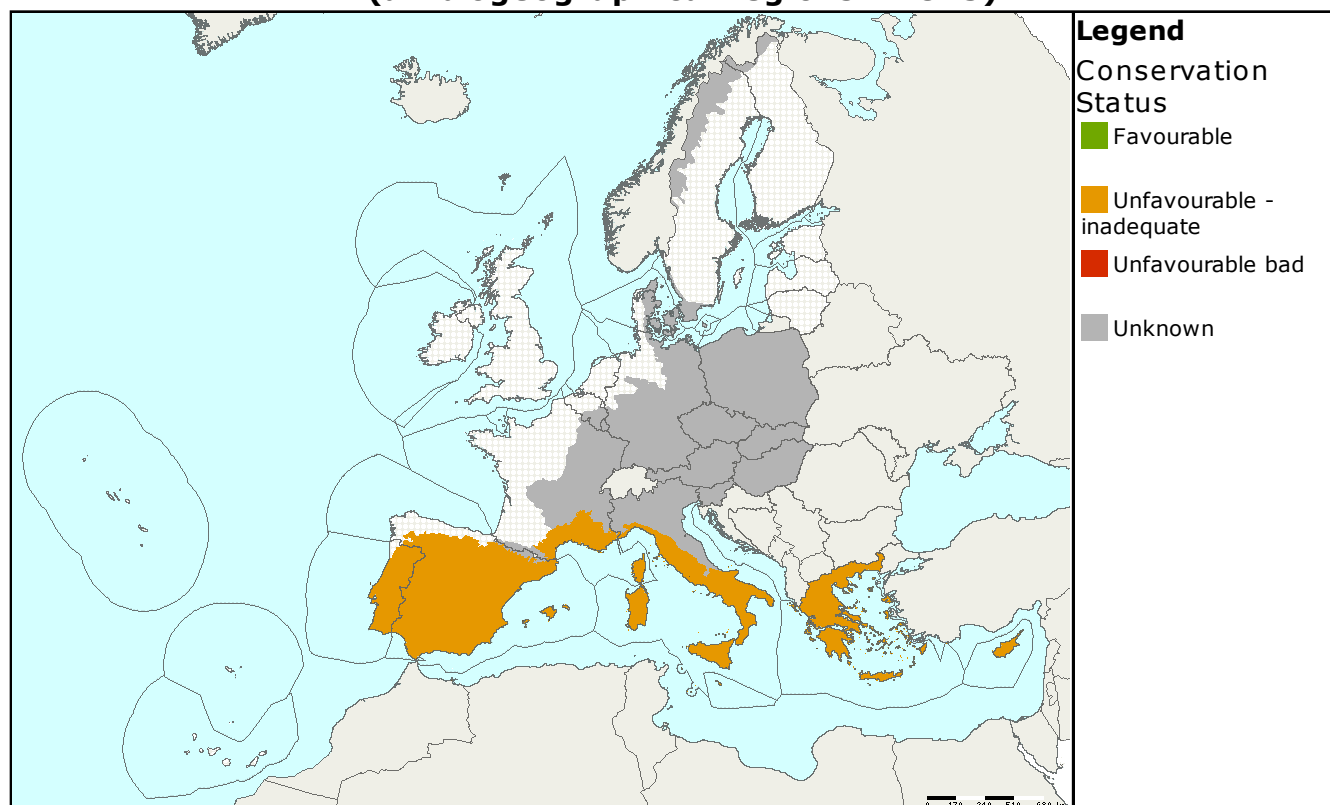

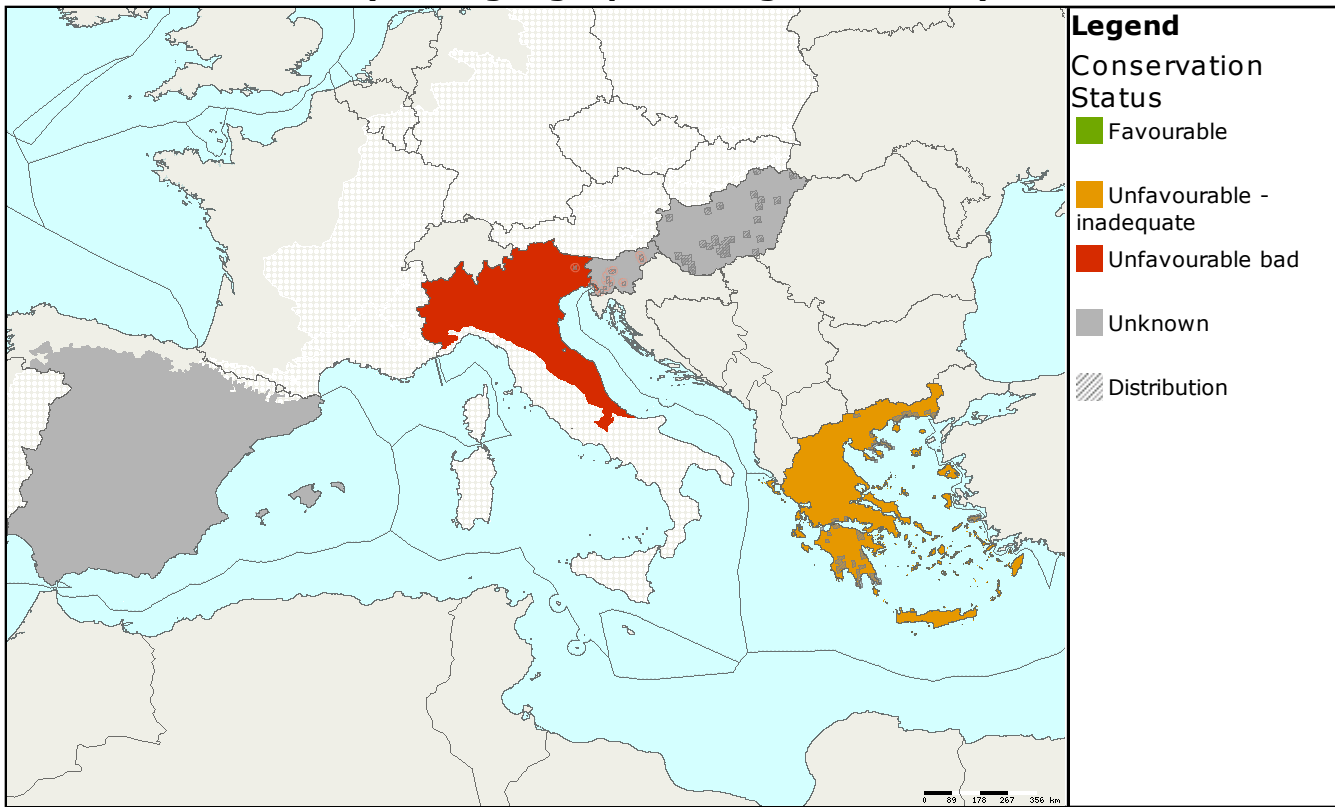

The golden jackal is mammal fairly common throughout its range. Due to its tolerance for dry habitats and its omnivorous diet, it can live in a wide variety of habitats. Its conservation status in the Alpine and Continental regions is 'unknown'. Small populations in these regions are the western edge of its extensive south-eastern range. In the Mediterranean region the golden jackal has an 'unfavourable-inadequate' conservation status. Conservation status in Pannonian region is 'unknown'. According to IUCN European mammal assessment this species is increasing and considered as 'least concern'.
