



The European mink (*Mustela lutreola*) only occurs in Europe. There is population in France and Spain and other populations are fragmented and mainly distributed across Eastern Europe. They depend on small, densely vegetated river systems where they hunt for small mammals and (semi-) aquatic species.

In the Alpine and Mediterranean biogeographical regions the status of this species is 'unknown' due to a lack of data from Spain. In the Atlantic and Boreal bogeographical regions its status was assessed as unfavourable 'bad'. The population has immensely decreased during the latest centuries and is still decreasing due to introduction of competing species and the destruction of habitats. The IUCN conservation status is 'Endangered'.
