



Myotis punicus is a bat that occurs in north-west Africa (Morocco, Algeria, Tunisia, and western Libya) and on the Mediterranean islands of Corsica (France), Sardinia (Italy) and Malta. This species forages in woodland, shrubland and semi-deserts. It roosts in underground sites, possibly also in buildings and bridges. The overall status of conservation is assessed as "unfavourable-inadequate" due to negative future prospects reported by France. The rest of individual parameters are reported as "unknown". The species is cave dwelling, only a small number of colonies are known and these are in tourist areas subject to disturbance. Consequently, it is listed as "Near Threatened" by IUCN.
