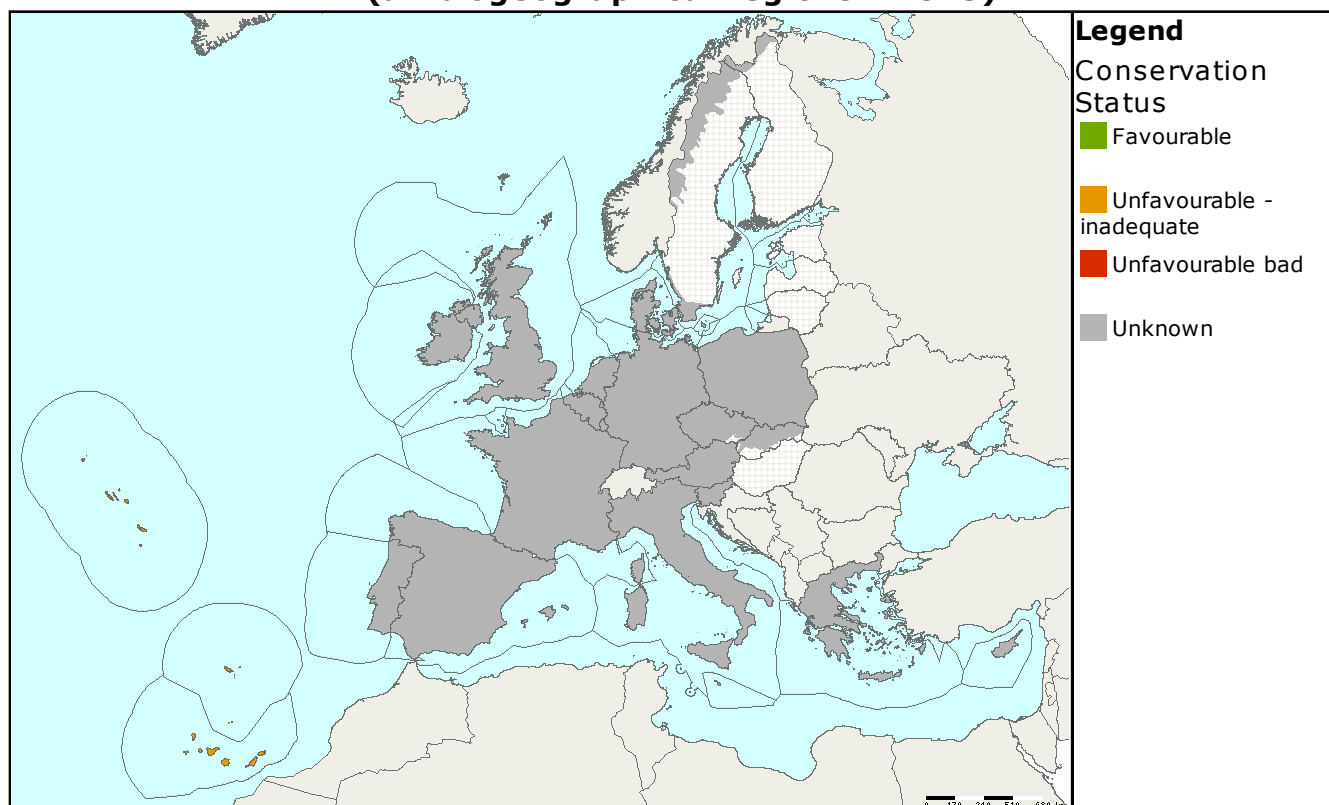

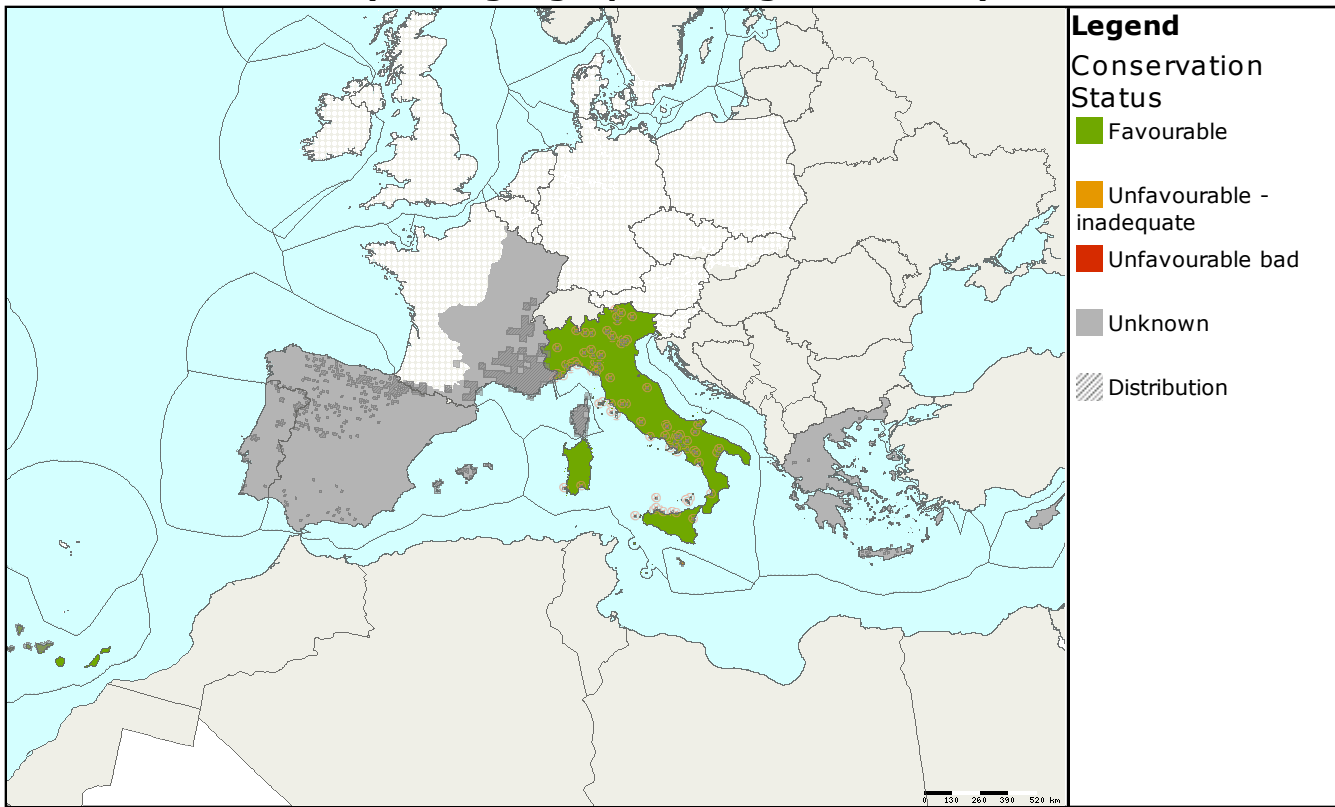

The European free-tailed bat is widely spread across all Mediterranean countries. It also occurs in some other parts of Asia. It mainly inhabits temperate to semi-desert habitats and mostly hides in rocky habitats.

The status of this species is largely ‘unknown’. In the Alpine, Atlantic, Continental and Mediterranean its overall assessment is ‘unknown’ and in the Macaronesian region it is assessed as ‘inadequate’. In order to do a good assessment more data are required, in particular data from the important habitats which mostly lie in France, Portugal and Spain. In Italy its status has been studied and assessed as ‘favourable’. The IUCN conservation status is ‘Least Concern’.
