Triturus italicus

The Italian newt is found through most of central and southern Italy. According to IUCN Red List data, the species is associated with woodland and agricultural habitats and breeds in a variety of temporary ponds, ditches, slow-moving streams and lakes.


The species is reported for three biogeographical regions (Alpine, Continental and Mediterranean). The conservation status of the species is assessed as 'favourable' in all three regions.

The IUCN Red list classifies the species as least concern due to its wide distribution, tolerance of a range of habitats and presumed large population (<http://www.iucnredlist.org/details/59476/0> consulted on 05 March 2015). The main pressures and threats are water abstractions from surface waters, infilling of ditches, dykes, ponds, pools, marshes or pits, reduction or loss of specific habitat features, urbanised areas, human habitation, agricultural intensification, silting up, drying out, modification of hydrographic functioning.

The map shows both Conservation Status and distribution using a 10 km x 10 km grid. Conservation status is assessed at biogeographical level. Therefore the representation in each grid cell is only illustrative.

Knowing that not all changes in conservation status between the reporting periods were genuine, Member States were asked to give the reasons for changes in conservation status. Bulgaria and Romania only joined the EU in 2007 and Greece did not report for 2007-12 so no reason is given for change for these countries. Greek data shown above is from 2001-06.

Main pressures and threats reported by Member States

Member States were asked to report the 20 most important threats and pressures using an agreed hierarchical list which can be found on the [Article 17 Reference Portal](#). Pressures are activities which are currently having an impact on the species and threats are activities expected to have an impact in the near future. Pressures and threats were ranked in three classes 'high, medium and low importance'; the tables below only show threats and pressures classed as 'high', for some species there were less than ten threats or pressures reported as highly important.

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i Assessment of conservation status at the European biogeographical level: Current Conservation Status (Current CS) shows the status for the reporting period 2007-2012, Previous Conservation Status (Previous CS) for the reporting period 2000-2006. Reason for change in conservation status between the reporting periods indicates whether the changes in the status were genuine or not genuine. Previous Conservation Status was not assessed for Steppic, Black Sea and Marine Black Sea regions. For these regions the Previous status is therefore considered as 'unknown'. The percentage of the species population occurring within the biogeographical/marine region (% in region) is calculated based on the area of GIS distribution.
